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

It is not possible to become a woman pilot without learning about Amelia Earhart. No one demands it, no one plans it, but her legacy is a beacon that shines on aspiring pilots. She did, of course, but among her records and fame, she was the inspiration for the International Forest of Friendship in Atchison, Kansas.

Each year a new class of inductees is added to the memorial. They are chosen for their contributions to aviation and not limited to women. A walk down Memory Lane there is like a review of the timeline of aviation .

Some names to be noted on their plaques include Charles A. Lindbergh, Sally Ride, Space Shuttle 7, Wiley Post, Fay Gillis Wells, Honorable John Lehman (Secretary of the Navy), Marsha Ivins NASA Astronaut, etc.

SAN ANTONIO

Our chapter was honored to have Colonel Michael Cosby as speaker at our February meeting. Col. Cosby is the son of 99 Margaret Cosby. He has served

in Iraq, Afghanistan, Bahrain, and Qatar the last three years. Now he is enroute to Command the Gulf Air War Center, which is a Center of Excellence in the region. He will teach advanced tactics to the GCC states.

Col. Cosby gave us a pictorial tour of Iraq sites of historical significance. A special site included was the Zuggerat of Ur, which is the birthplace of the Patriarch Abraham.

The Central Command Area of Responsibility (AOR) stretches 5,400 miles across Iraq and Afghanistan, encompassing more than 6 hundred million people.

Currently, US Central Command Air Forces have more than 270 aircraft, made up of F15s & 16s, A-10s, Unmanned Aerial Vehicles and helicopters.

In the last three years, he has flown more than 200 combat sorties over Iraq and was the Vice Commander of the Air Forces in Iraq. He was then selected to serve as the Chief of Staff to the Commander US Central Command Air Forces, overseeing all air operations in the AOR.

Technology has advanced significantly since the first Gulf War, back in 1991. They do lots of bombing, but use GPS and night vision goggles.

The bombs being used have much greater accuracy now. They can pinpoint a specific window in a specific building, taking out only one room. Many of the UAVs, and their bombs, are controlled from as far away as Nellis Air Force Base in Las Vegas, Nevada.

The USAF has established a large Theater Hospital in Balad, Iraq. Our modern military is capable of getting most wounded to the hospital within the first hour of being wounded. If a service man arrives at this hospital alive, there is a 98% probability that he/she

will live. Those who need additional care are sent to a hospital in Germany.

Kirkuk Air Base in Northern Iraq is important because 6.4% of the world's oil is there. Al Udeid Air Base is the largest in the region. In addition, it is also where the Combined Air Operations Center (CAOC) is located. The CAOC is responsible for all air operations in the AOR. Michael said 98% of the people in Iraq want us there until they can successfully run their own country.

After speaking, we had a brief question

and answer period. It was a very interesting and educational meeting, and we thank Col. Cosby for the time he spent with us.

NASA REPORT

I used to do research at Kennedy and Johnson Space Centers, so I like reminiscing by writing about NASA news.

The space shuttle Atlantis (STS-117) took off on June 8th without a hitch. This is the 24th mission to visit the International Space Station (ISS). What a celebration for spaceflight. Mission tasks include the installation of a new truss segment for the ISS and some new solar arrays. Also, they take the wonderful food supplies to the ISS crew and remove all the dirty laundry that's gathered.

One of the most exciting things for me about STS-117 is Mission Specialist, female aviator Sunita Williams. Her return on Atlantis caps the longest female stay on the ISS.

She came into the Astronaut Corp in 1998. She is a Navy Commander and flies helicopters. She has participated in deployments to support Dessert Shield and Operation Provide Comfort. She has logged over 2770 flight hours in more than 30 different aircraft.

Looking to the future there will be another mission lander going to Mars, The Phoenix. The Mars lander is a mosquito looking lander that is the first in the NASA Mars Scout Program. This program is a partnership between government, academia and industry. The university of Arizona will be first. The lander will be able to dig deep into the Martian soil to retrieve samples to determine the history of water on Mars and to determine the habitability potential for the planet. These tasks are a must if anyone is to visit Mars. The window for launch is August 3-28th. If you'd like more information click onto: http://phoenix.lpl.arizona.edu/mission.php

Something else to think about is Dark Energy. We live in this wonderful universe day to day and don't realize that it is expanding faster than it ever has in history. It has long been known that the universe has been growing since its origin 13.7 billion years ago. Scientists have believed that the expansion would slow over time due to gravity. However, astrophysicists in 1998 discovered the expansion is speeding up. They theorize that the "energy" causing this mystery is opposing gravity and is called "Dark Energy." The idea is not truly new because Einstein had included "anti-gravity" effect in his theory of general relativity in his "cosmological constant." This Dark Energy makes up two-thirds

of the universe and yet scientists don't know what it is. So you are thinking-SO WHAT? Well, just think-if scientists up to this point have developed all these basic theories that are understood as fundamental (the one's that all of us were taught in school as the laws of the universe) but yet they have no understanding about two thirds of the universe "Dark Energy"-well this leaves scientists scrapping for new elementary descriptions of electrons, neutrinos etc. These key parts are today's modern life like electronics, computers, cell phones, engineering and medicine. Basically, science needs a major upgrade and no one knows where to start. So what is next? NASA, the Department of Energy and the National Science Foundation have joined forces to plan space satellites and ground-based telescopes that will probe the properties of Dark Energy. This investigation will take place light years away, but will indicate the implications of Dark Energy. If it continues then the "Big Rip" will happen, pulling all of the universe apart or it will continue to expand into the "Big Chill", out to the coldest parts of space. If the Dark Energy gets weaker then gravity may take over and then the "Big Crunch" will occur. OOOOUUUUUCCCCCHHHH!!!!!
