

So, what does it require to be the *Approach* Editor? Mostly it takes a lot of enthusiasm to do a good job for the section. Knowledge of the printing process would be helpful, but most printers will work with an amateur willing to learn and take their advice. (How do you think I learned all this stuff in the first place? It wasn't skill, because I didn't know how half this stuff worked when I started! I had a lot of help along the way from several printing companies.)

This job also requires a fair amount of knowledge on how the section and The 99s work. Sometimes the editor is the last stop before something incorrect goes to print. I've spoken to chapters who have left things out of their registration forms, I've made changes to articles that had incorrect (or incomplete) information on 99s projects, I've asked the board for clarification on procedures and many other things over the years.

As the editor you'll be the one to receive reports from the Board of Directors, Advisors, Chapters and members with a good story to tell. You'll edit the reports/stories for clarity and space. You'll edit photos. You'll have to get the *Approach* in a print-ready file. (Which is not the same thing as getting it ready for your desktop printer!)

THE APPROACH: A 15-YEAR RETROSPECTIVE

When I told Governor Chis Swain and Vice-Governor Jan McKenzie that Dottie and I would be doing our last *Approach* with this issue, I stopped to think how long I had been working on the *Approach* in one capacity or another: 15 years.

15 years! I have been a 99 for 20 years, so most of the time I've been a 99 I've been working on the *Approach* twice every year. It just doesn't seem possible it's been that long!

Many things have changed since I took over the *Approach* from Pat Ward in 1993. When Pat did the magazine, she was printing out the columns and doing a physical cut & paste into the "blue lines" for the printer. The printer then took a camera "shot" of the blue lines and added the photos in for us. I spent almost a week at Pat's house in Baton Rouge learning what in the world I was supposed to do. It wasn't all work, Pat took me out sightseeing while I was there. It was the beginning of a friend-ship that has lasted a long, long time.

I didn't do the manual cut & paste when I started doing the magazine. I was able to do the columns and everything in Word Perfect and print out a final page (except for photos). I kid you not, the 32-page *Approach* was done in Word Perfect. (This was before MS Word became popular!)

It was almost mandatory for Chapters to submit reports back in those days. We could fill 32-pages and have articles left over for the next issue. We didn't put the Section meeting registration in the *Approach* back then, either. Chapters had to print and mail to the entire section membership. Anyone miss doing that?

Through the years we've changed printers several times, started submitting the Approach to the printer by email, gave up our mailing permit because it was cheaper/easier to use a mailing house and various other things. I've gone from using Word Perfect to MS Publisher to Adobe Pagemaker and now Adobe InDesign. I've learned to scan photos, scan and OCR type-written submissions into the page layout program, and learned all about what a printer needs for an electronic file. And how did we survive without email? I now do some paying work doing desktop publishing. All because of the Approach. Everything I learned, I practiced on you, the section. Thanks!

I used to come up with catchy deadline reminders. One time I said something to the effect of "I don't care if you send your report in crayon–send it anyway!" Janet Koonce of the Purple Sage Chapter took me up on that. Well, it was a note in purple crayon (and the report was typed).To this day, that note still makes me smile when I think of it!

It was through the Approach that I became a lot more involved with the Section. I eventually became the Section Treasurer and then Governor when I finally lived within the section boundaries again. Since my husband Kent was in the Air Force, we moved every three years or so. This turned into the Section version of "Where's Waldo?" "Where do you live now?" was what I heard frequently at section meetings.

I think that I've grown up a lot from doing this work for the Section. Thanks for all the memories!

SPOTLIGHT ON: PAT WARD


Friends who thought Pat Ward had just faded into the sunset should be glad to know what she has been up to lately.


